

RusRoL relevance: How Imperial tolerance (or indifference) gave way to Soviet fascism and forced conformity, which is still present today in modified form.

"Western-style democracies depend on the rule of law that regulates checks and balances among power centres. These concepts, much less their realisation in practice, were alien to most Central Asians." (p. 249)

Reason to read: This history of Central Asia is readable and accurate, and implies the point that what destroyed the tolerance (due to indifference) of the Tsarist authorities to practical day-to-day freedom of ordinary people in remote parts of the Empire was STALIN and, through him (this is the general civilisational point) BUREAUCRACY. You cannot manage a multi-cultural national community by bureaucracy as bureaucracy always has to standardise, while the essence of multi-culturalism is diversity (i.e. no standardisation).
